## The Importance of Shading!

Leopard attack! Cym. (Speckles x Splatters) 'Woodside', out of a flask/hybrid made by Casa de la Orquideas. Note the dispersion/aggregation of spots based on low light (left) versus high light (right) exposure of the flowers (2 divisions of the same plant at different locations in my backyard). Shading improves the jaguar/leopard pattern. Based on identical observations this year on several of my other spotted plants, I will shade more these types of flowers in the future to highlight the markings.

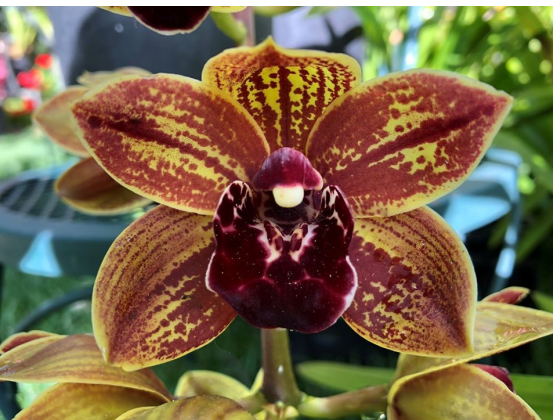
## More on shading - shade your greens!



The three photos above are of the same orchid. The photo on the left is one I took at the Santa Barbara Orchid Show in 2017, Cym Devon Jade 'Kathleen', it was Grand Champion Cymbidium. It was interesting to hear the comments of the general public and also more knowledgeable Cymbidium growers. Many felt that the flower was 'dirty', certainly the brown overlay gave it that appearance. I probably would have argued that the flower was a polychrome (zoom-in to get a better look at the flower).

On the 12 April, Daniel Stocks, USA, posted the two photos (centre & right) on the Facebook, Gold Coast Cymbidium Growers site, of a division of Cym Devon Jade 'Kathleen'. It is obvious that Daniel has given this plant a reasonable amount of shade and has brought out the clean green color - a terrific effort Daniel! Whether this flowering would have achieved the same result as in 2017, is anyone's guess! Even though I like polychrome flowers, a green and red combination is hard to beat!

## Purchasing online in South Australia

South Australia has always been a good source for buying orchids of many genera. I can still recall visiting Adelaide Orchids many years ago, Jan was expecting our second son, so that would be thirty eight years ago. I can't remember everything I bought, but I do know I purchased a plant of Cymbidium Peppermint and I wish that I still had this plant in my collection today, it succumbed to rot many years ago. It was a Cym sinense hybrid. Mrs H Ireland made the cross sinense x Rosalita, and registered it in 1964. I only flowered the plant once but it produced tall upright spikes of highly fragrant brownish, striped flowers. It is still on my wanted list!

While there are still a number of orchid nurseries in SA not all of them cater for online sales. When we think Cymbidiums, probably the main nursery is Guest Orchids, along with the much smaller Sundaani Orchids, and of course there are some reputable eBay sellers. Graham and Barrie Morris, formerly Valley Orchids, regularly have offerings on eBay. For those growers chasing orchid flasks, Pauline's Laboratories has a wonderful selection of Greg Bryant's latest crosses. Seedlings - tomorrow's champions!

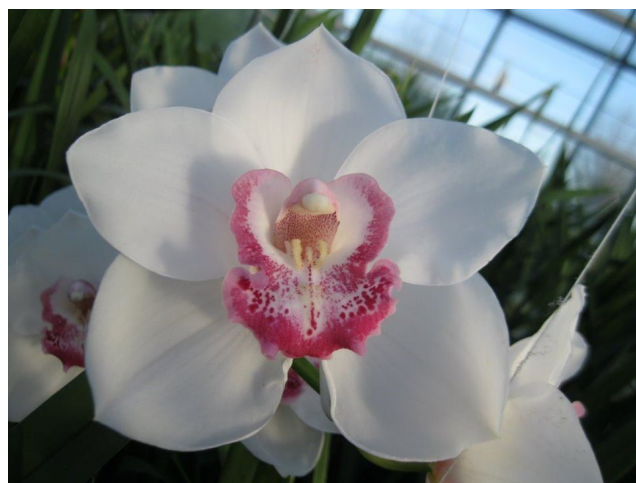
Guest Orchids, carry a wide selection of plants, some from their own hybridising program and many from New Horizon Orchids, Andy Easton. They have an active Facebook presence, with many photographs of some highly colored pot-plant-type, miniatures and intermediates. It would also be unwise to ignore the possibility that there would be some exhibition types among them. The development of miniatures and intermediates has largely been ignored in Australia (except for Kevin Butler, Nado Lenkic and David Wain) and we are crying out for something new, Guest Orchids, may have what you are looking for. Graham Guest puts out a list of available plants once or twice per year but you will need to contact the nursery to have it emailed to you.

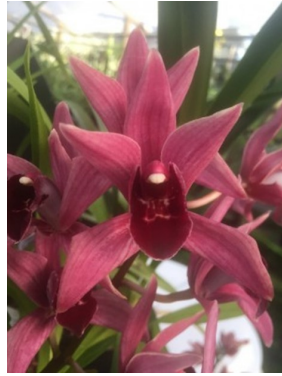
